

# Science Curriculum Progression Overview

<b>Rationale</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Our Science curriculum is driven by our LEARN statement for our learners to achieve and succeed in science by providing <b>engagement, ambition, relevance and nurture</b> in our approach to this subject</li> <li>- to provide the foundations for <b>understanding the world</b> through the specific disciplines of biology, chemistry and physics</li> <li>- to build up a body of key foundational <b>knowledge, concepts and vocabulary</b> alongside strong enquiry skills</li> <li>- to value the power of <b>rational explanation</b> and develop a sense of <b>excitement and curiosity</b> about natural phenomena</li> </ul>
<b>Approach</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- to build understanding progressively through unit <b>themes and science projects</b>;</li> <li>- use <b>relevant contexts</b>, diverse scientists and role models to value the impact of scientific thinking to the world</li> <li>- promote understanding and accurate and precise <b>use of vocabulary</b></li> <li>- highlight achievements of <b>scientists and industry</b> links to maximize pupils' engagement with and motivation to study science</li> <li>- embed 'working scientifically' and <b>enquiry approaches</b> and skills throughout the curriculum</li> <li>- <b>make connections</b> across learning and with the wider community e.g. apply their mathematical knowledge, geographical understanding, historical context</li> </ul>
<b>Working Scientifically</b>	<p>'Working scientifically' is the ability to work and think like scientists in every science lesson. The enquiry approaches and skills of science for each year group below. These are taught in context of the unit or project content. Children learn to use a variety of enquiry approaches and skills to answer relevant scientific questions.</p>
